Their funding comes from private donations, ReStore sales, and mortgage payments of previous Habitat homeowners.

Habitat for Humanity of Kanawha and Putnam serves both of our local counties. Each county has its own ReStore. ReStore merchandise consists of donations from individuals, contractors, businesses, retailers, and manufacturers. They are open to the public.

There are numerous ways you can get involved, if you are interested. Volunteers are needed in Family Selection, Family Support, Property Acquisition, and Construction. Two of our church members, Barney Frazier and Bill Vieweg, are members of the "Tuesday Crew" constructing houses. Another church member, Jerome Hairston, volunteers as a Committee Member.

To be new Habitat homeowners, one must help in building the house by investing 200 hours of sweat equity. He/she also attends homeowner classes to learn how to maintain their new home and to learn financial management.

As you may know our Nurture 'N' Action Team sponsored a food drive for Common Grounds on Saturday, June 4. It was held in our front church parking lot. Donations were welcomed as the need for food to feed the needy in our community is ever-present. When all was said and done, they had collected 1308 items, an amazing amount of food items! Needless to say, Common Grounds wholeheartedly thanks the Nurture 'N' Action Team for all its work in putting on this food drive and all the generous church members and friends who responded so faithfully to the need for the food donations. You are such a blessing to us! Genuine thanks to one and all!

As we shared with you in a recent article of ours, our number of families we've been serving had decreased during the last two years because of COVID. We are happy to share that the numbers we are serving are increasing...and we are so grateful we can be meeting those needs. In June, the "extras" for our families in addition to their monthly boxes are a three-pound tube of ground beef, hamburger buns, and a package of cheese slices. These seasonal choices are being welcomed!



If you can help us this month, we are focusing on foods for the homeless people we serve. Of great importance in selecting cans for them is that they have Pop Tops (like those on soda cans.) Usually they do not have (or do not have access to) can openers. We include in their boxes food items that are ready to eat and individual servings. Food items for you to consider in purchasing food for them are the following: Vienna Sausages in cans, pork and beans in cans, fruit in cans or individual servings, pudding or Jello in individual servings, tuna fish or chicken in cans, vegetables in cans, ready-to-eat pasta in cans, granola bars, and disposable forks, spoons, knives, and napkins.

As you know we are grateful for whatever food you donate. Please place them in the woven trunk in the Narthex.
