## **ANGEL TREE** - It Starts With A GIFT

Angel Tree is a Prison Fellowship program that serves incarcerated parents by giving them a way to restore and strengthen the relationships with their children and families. Every Christmas, Angel Tree mobilizes local churches and organizations to minister to hundreds of thousands of children by delivering a gift, a personal message of love from their mom or dad in prison, and the Good News of the Gospel.

Here's how it works: Angel Tree coordinators gather information from inmates who want to participate in the program and provide it to local churches and organizations. Volunteers prepare "angel gift tags" to provide the information to those who wish to purchase gifts. Morris Memorial has actively supported this ministry for many years. This year we have been asked to serve 22 local families with a total of 36 children.

Every child receives **TWO GIFTS**, each of which is valued between \$15 and \$20. One gift is a **FUN** gift (a type of toy, game, etc.) which is suggested by the inmate. The other gift is an item of **CLOTHING** which is suggested by the child's caregiver (type of clothing, size and color preference noted on the gift tag). Two Christmas trees with the angel gift tags will be set up in the entryway of the church sanctuary beginning Sunday, November 21<sup>st</sup>; one tree for the clothing gifts and the other for the fun gifts (pink ribbons for girls and blue ribbons for boys). Participants may choose to purchase a single gift or several if desired.

All gifts are to be wrapped and labeled with the angel gift tag and need to be brought to the church by **<u>SUNDAY, DECEMBER 12<sup>TH</sup> at the latest.</u>** Volunteers will be present in the sanctuary entryway to receive the gifts before and after the Sunday worship services on November 21<sup>st</sup>, November 28<sup>th</sup>, and December 5<sup>th</sup> (at other times the gifts may be given to Erin in the church office). Families will pick up the gifts the following week at which time they are also given the opportunity to request a free Adventure Bible for young children or a Teen Life Application Study Bible for older children.

All the angel tags that were prepared were taken on Sunday, November 21<sup>st</sup>. HOWEVER, we hopefully anticipate that we will be able to hang more tags soon. Why the wait? Before preparing each angel tag, contact needs to be made with the children's caregivers. Because some of the caregivers could not be reached by phone, it has been necessary to follow up with a request by mail. As responses are received, more angel tags will be prepared and hung on the trees. Thank you for your patience. Our hearts are full and overflowing with gratitude to the Worship Team for sponsoring our Thanksgiving Food Drive once again. The results show our congregation willingly opened their hearts and their wallets to purchase food to share with our local underprivileged families. When all was said and done, <u>744 items</u> were donated four Sundays prior to Thanksgiving. If you were in church those Sundays, you could see them all collected each Week in the front of the church. It truly was quite impressive, wasn't it?

The Worship Team could not have done it without you, our church family and friends. You were so generous and, because of that, many of our needy neighbors had food both for their Thanksgiving meals but also in their monthly boxes because of you! Just think! These families who receive our Thanksgiving boxes were able to celebrate this special holiday right along with us! They were blessed by your generosity; you, in turn, were blessed just knowing you have made their Thanksgiving meals possible. It's a "Win – Win" situation. Thank you soooooo much!!
