## A Word From Pastor Steve

“Which Way, Lord?”  
(Some Keys for Discerning God’s Will)

A new year is upon us with new possibilities, new opportunities, new decisions, and perhaps in some ways, a new direction for our lives. And as Christians, as followers of Jesus, we certainly want to follow His leading regarding the goals and priorities for our lives. We want to express all our gratitude for His mercy and love by seeking to honor Him by our attitudes, words, and actions that are in obedience to His will. The Apostle Paul often emphasized this in his letters. For example, in Colossians 1:10 he said, “We pray this in order that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and may please Him in every way.” So it’s very important that, in any given matter or situation, we remain certain and confident that we are in the center of God’s will. If you are like me, sometimes that is very clear and easy to see. However, at other times, it simply isn’t. There are times when there are an awful lot of clouds, fog, and confusion....

So when the way forward is unclear and there are perhaps a variety of options before us, how should we decide which prompting is correct, which idea is best, and which direction is in fact the one God wants us to take? Here are some of the issues and questions that help me stay on the right course.

### 1. VOICE

Whose voice is this that I hear? Is it God’s voice? Does what this voice is saying align with God’s character and will?

Deuteronomy 30:20 “Love the Lord your God, listen to His voice, and hold fast to Him. For the Lord is your life...”

John 10:4 “His sheep follow Him because they know His voice.”

### 2. SCRIPTURE

Is this prompting, this idea, this cause, this goal, this desire, this practice, etc., is it in agreement with scripture? (God’s Word reveals God’s mind, God’s design, God’s way and God’s will.)

Psalms 119:105 “Your (God’s) word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.”

James 1:25 “But the man (person) who looks intently into the perfect law (scripture) that gives freedom, and continues to do this, not forgetting what he has heard, but doing it, he will be blessed in what he does.”

### 3. WISDOM

Is this truly the best, for the most people, from the most perspectives, especially God’s? Will it really produce the results that it promises? Is this the kind of thing that Jesus would do? That Godly people would do?

Ephesians 5:15-16 “Be very careful, then, how you live, not as unwise, but as wise, making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil.”

James 1:5 “If any of you lacks wisdom, he should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to him.”

## 4. WIRING

Does this idea, voice, direction, etc. align with how I am “wired”? Is it consistent with my gifts, skills, personality, interests, and abilities?

Psalm 139:13 “You (God) created my inmost being; You knit me together in my mother’s womb.”

Ephesians 2:10 “For we are God’s workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.”

## 5. FRIENDS

What do my closest Christian friends think about this? Does this prompting align with their perception of me and God’s will for me? (Ask them to pray about this and report back to you what they “hear” from God.)

Proverbs 15:22 “Plans fail for lack of counsel, but with many advisers they succeed.”

Proverbs 27:9b “The pleasantness of one’s friend springs from his earnest counsel.”

My friends, if you will utilize these considerations and questions, I am confident that, together, they will go a long way toward helping you to stay in the center of God’s will....May 2019 be an especially satisfying and productive year for you and your family!!

### *Play and Pray on New Year’s Eve*

*Morris Memorial will offer both fellowship and worship on New Year’s Eve. Several members have asked us to have a game night followed by a Watch Night Service. Beginning at 9 p.m. we will have snacks, board games, and conversation. You are invited to bring a favorite snack to share, or a favorite board game, or both. At 11:30 we will have a quiet, prayerful, contemplative worship service to pray in the New Year.*



### **What Can We Do about the Opioid Crisis?**

The National Institute on Drug Addiction has said that West Virginia has the highest rate of opioid-related overdose deaths in the United States. In a year’s time more than 700 of our fellow West Virginians died from such overdoses. We are not just talking about numbers. We are talking about people, and these people are our neighbors. Jesus said that the greatest commandment is the commandment to love our neighbors. What can we do?

We at Morris Memorial are going to take a serious look at this question. On Jan. 27, plan to stay after worship for a meal and a presentation by the Rev. Barry Ball. Barry is our bishop’s husband. He has a remarkable way of helping people with non-scientific minds to understand the science behind addiction. He also has some ideas for Christians who want to make a difference. Our own Dr. Ed Eskew works in addiction medicine, and he is willing to help us to continue the conversation and to discover how we can help our neighbors. Please join us on Jan. 27.

## Bishop Steiner Ball to Meet with Laity



Bishop Sandra Steiner Ball is inviting the laity to a gathering to acknowledge the anxious times we are in as the United Methodist Church prepares for the Special General Conference in February 2019. She will meet with the laity of the Midland South and Western Districts on Sunday, Jan. 6 at Forrest Burdette UMC in Hurricane from 3:00 to 5:00 pm. The tentative agenda will include: Devotional time, bringing us up to date on the conversation about The Way Forward, sharing how this General Conference will do its work together and interpreting the Judicial Council decisions and how they impact the work of the General Conference. This important

meeting will also attempt to address misinformation and frequently asked questions. This time together will be an opportunity for the laity of our District to hear directly from the bishop on the current work being done as The United Methodist Church navigates a way forward that would honor our Lord and help us fulfill our mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

## How Many Kings Came to Bethlehem?

We all know the hymn about the three kings. It is a beautiful and moving hymn. Yet, the title is based not on scripture but on tradition. Matthew is the only New Testament writer who mentions the mysterious visitors from the East who bring gifts to the Holy Child of Bethlehem. He does not call these men kings. He calls them *magi*. This word has often been translated into English as *wise men*. The term refers to an ethnic group from Persia (modern Iran). This group is known for experts in astronomy who were advisors to some of the most power leaders in their part of the world.

These men were not kings, and Matthew does not say how many of them there were. The popular notion that there were three men probably grew out of the fact that Matthew tells us of three gifts which they brought. An older tradition suggested that there were twelve of these men who came to Bethlehem. Because the journey from Persia to Bethlehem was so difficult and so dangerous, it seems unlikely that a group of only three would make such a trip.

Don't write off this hymn, however. In stanzas 2-4 John Hopkins, Jr. helps us to understand the significance of the gifts which were brought by the wise men.

Born a King on Bethlehem's plain, gold I bring to crown him again,  
King forever, ceasing never, over us all to reign.

Frankincense to offer have I; incense owns a Deity nigh;  
Prayer and praising, voices raising, worshiping God on high.

Myrrh is mine; its bitter perfume breathes a life of gathering gloom;  
Sorrowing, sighing, bleeding, dying, sealed in the stone-cold tomb.

January 6 is Epiphany, the day when we remember the coming of the wise men. The word Epiphany means a manifestation of a divine or supernatural being. The gifts of the wise men show us that the Christ Child is indeed divine—a divine King Whose death has special significance.
