Confirmation to Be Celebrated June 9

JUNE 2019

On June 9, which is Pentecost Sunday, we will celebrate the confirmation of four youth and at least one adult. Pastor Mark has led four middle school students through a series of classes dealing with basic Christian doctrine, the history of Christianity, the history of Methodism, the meaning of the sacraments, and the plan of salvation. Along the way they have memorized the books of the bible and the Ten Commandments.

Those who are confirmed will be answering several questions, all of which they have

discussed at length with Pastor Mark. The young people are prepared to profess their faith in Christ and to make certain promises to God and to the congregation. Each of them has made very specific promises to Pastor Mark regarding support of the ministries of the church through prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness. These fine young folks are taking these commitments quite seriously. Some have committed to tithing. (What an example for the rest of us!)

It will be a joy to celebrate the confirmation of Ellie Eskew, Clark Gillispie, Will Gillispie, and Samuel Morris. These fine young people have been active in our church for several years, as have their parents. We will also be confirming Mark Miller. Mark started attending our church after he met Pastor Mark at the 2017 M.E.C. Christmas program. He has a United Methodist background, but he had never

Contributions for Mission Trip Requested

Gloriann and I are returning to Mexico for the week of August 3-10 for an Eye Care mission trip through Medical Ministry International. Our congregation has been generous in partnering with us whenever we have had unexpected expenses, and we find ourselves needing your support again this year.

One of the areas where we have problems yearly is getting our supplies through customs. We have several companies which generously donate supplies which we need to run our clinic and especially to provide cataract surgery. Unfortunately, often the Customs agents in Mexico City will not allow us to bring in some of the supplies. We never know from year to year what supplies we will be permitted to bring in and which we won't. This makes planning for our projects quite challenging.

Our missionary in Mexico has decided that, to be sure we get our supplies into the country, we should ship them in rather than trying to carry them in ourselves. Unfortunately we have to pay an import duty if we use this approach, and we anticipate it will be a fee of about \$ 4,000.

In a way this is still a bargain, as we anticipate performing about 125 cataract surgeries and giving away several hundred pairs of glasses in our week there. But this expense is not part of the budget for the project, so we need to raise money to cover this extra expense.

Every year we have the opportunity to help people who otherwise would have no way to regain their sight. I think of several special patients: A 7 year old boy who was sent home from school because he could not see and was therefore felt to be unteachable. He had cataract surgery on both eyes and is back in school. Or the woman in her 40's who went blind from cataracts at age 12. She had married and had four children whom she had never seen. None of us who saw her reaction will forget the joy of her being able to see her husband and oldest daughter when we took her eye patch off the day after surgery. Or the older man who was ready to commit suicide because he had gone blind

from cataracts. He heard about our mission trip coming to town and decided to delay his suicide until giving us a chance to help him. He now goes to church with his daughters and thanks God regularly for his miracle.

If you are willing to partner with us in this mission project by donating to the cause, please put your contribution in the offering plate with the designation "Caudill Mission Trip." Checks should be made out to Morris Memorial. Your giving will be added to your regular tithes and contributions given to the church and will be tax-deductible. Contributions will be accepted in June and July, whenever you have an opportunity to give. Thank you for your continued support.

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Thank You and God Bless You

June 9 will be my last Sunday to preach at Morris Memorial. I will miss this congregation. I will miss the staff. I will miss others in the community.

It was for many reasons a great honor to be appointed as your pastor five years ago. Soon after we moved to Charleston I found that Morris Memorial had some challenges which had not been mentioned to me. I also found, however, that there were some delightful people at Morris who were kinder and more generous than I would have had a right to expect. Even when the going got tough, I looked forward to every Sunday morning. I also looked forward to every Wednesday morning. Chapel with the children of M.E.C. was always a great joy. The Wednesday morning bible study was also a blessing.

The most shocking news that I received upon my arrival was that for several years the church had been spending more money every year and had been receiving less in contributions every year. With the help of a very fine Finance Committee we reduced the budget by \$50,000. This reduction in spending helped us, over time, to reduce our conference apportionment. We also had a couple of successful stewardship campaigns and increased the amount of contributions.

Our failure to resolve some other issues caught up with us, however. Conflict over the role of the Morris Enrichment Center, misunderstanding over some financial issues, disagreement over worship

styles, and a nasty gossip mill all took their toll. Attendance began to decline noticeably, especially at the 11:00 service. Our giving resumed its downward trend. I regret that I was not able to lead in solving these problems, and I feel badly that Pastor Bob is going to have so many challenges here. The last couple of years have not been easy for me or for the church.

I hope that you will not give up. There are issues which need to be resolved, but this church still has a lot going for it. I believe that Morris Memorial has the most visible location of any United Methodist Church in the southern half of West Virginia. We have a facility which is both beautiful and functional.



More importantly than this, we have great people. We have members who are extremely generous. We have members who are deeply committed to Christ and to the church. The talent which we have in this church is truly remarkable.

As important as all of this is, we have something more important yet. We have the truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit.

My time as your pastor is coming to an end. I will soon be serving in another place. There will be much for me to do in Hardy County as the pastor of the Duffey Memorial and Bass Churches, but I will not forget you. I will keep you, your church, and your new pastor in my prayers.

Bishop Steiner Ball understands that Morris Memorial is a good church with the potential to be a great church. She understands that this congregation is important to the community and to the annual conference. She has taken Morris Memorial seriously enough that she has recruited a specially trained pastor from another conference to lead your congregation. Pastor Bob brings many gifts, but he will need your support. Please understand that although I love the people of Morris Memorial my commitment to Christ and to the United Methodist connection requires that I not interfere with your new pastor's ministry. (It also requires that I give my full attention to Duffey Memorial Church, Bass Church, and the Moorefield and Bass communities.)

I hope to hear from you now and then. It will be good to know how you are. I will be glad to share some news from our family (especially the grandchildren). When what you need is a pastor, however, you will need to contact Pastor Bob or Pastor Steve.

Thank you for your kindness, your generosity, your support, and especially your prayers. God bless you.

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A WORD FROM PASTOR STEVE

"Wasted Trials"

Jesus said, "What I tell you in the dark, speak in the daylight; what is whispered in your ear, proclaim from the roofs." (Matthew 10:27)

Our Lord Jesus regularly takes us into the dark, that He may tell us important things. He leads us, for example, into the deep darkness of bereavement, or the scary shadows of disease and illness, or the crushing darkness of confusion and disappointment. It is there that He can often get our complete attention. It is there that He tells us His secrets, great and wonderful, if we are willing to listen. It is there, in the darkness, that we can more clearly detect His voice, which is so often drowned out amidst all the numerous voices and noises of earthly life.

But such communications and revelations **always** imply a corresponding, vitally significant **responsibility**: "**speak** in the daylight.....**proclaim** from the roofs." It is not God's will (in most instances) for us to always linger in the dark, or stay in the closet. At a time of God's choosing, we will be given the opportunity to return to our place in the rush of life, and when that time comes, we are to speak and proclaim what we have learned.

This certainly gives new meaning to suffering, because one of the saddest and most frustrating aspects of suffering is that it often seems to have no clear and important **purpose**. This is often revealed in such common statements as: "How useless I am at this time!" "I feel so worthless!" "How, in this condition, can I do anything for anyone?" "What a waste of precious time and opportunity this is!"

Such are the desperate laments of the sufferer. But the truth is this: God **does** have a **purpose** for it all, even if you don't readily see it. And often it has to do with some **message** that He wants you to share with others around you who desperately need to hear it.

Were the forty days that Moses spent on Mount Sinai wasted (Ex. 24)? Or that period that Elijah spent on Mount Horeb (1 Kings 19)? Or the years that Paul spent in Arabia (Gal. 1:11-18)? Or the forty days that Jesus spent in the desert being tempted by the devil (Mat. 4:1-11)? My friends, there is no shortcut to the life of faith, which is the vital condition of a holy and victorious life. Like it or not, we must have these periods of lonely meditation and desperate fellowship with God. They are as essential to our maintaining a healthy and satisfying soul life, as food is essential to our maintaining a healthy, satisfying, and productive physical life.

So, my friends, **don't waste your trials!** Rather, **learn** from them, and **use** them, to **get closer** to Jesus, to **honor** Jesus, and to **help** some other struggling souls who are facing similar circumstances.

Then when you are standing in some terrible trial that is hammering you like raging flood waters that have risen clear up to your neck, you can look out at those who are staring at you with paralyzing fear, and you can yell to them, **"Don't be afraid, dear hearts, for I can feel the bottom, and IT IS SOLID!!!**
