Monday, March 15, 2021

John 3:14-21



V. 14 is a look back at Numbers 2:8-9—*this week's Old Testament lectionary reading*. It defines God's purpose for sending the Son, who willingly shed his blood and died on the cross, only to be lifted up on the third day.

What does v. 17 teach about the strategic and divine plan God had for the Son? What does v. 18 say about condemnation? Explain in some detail.

Wednesday, March 17, 2021

Psalm 107:1-3, 17-22



V. 1 clearly states that we should give thanks to the LORD, and that his love does *indeed* endure forever. We learn in this passage that even though we turn away in our frail humanity, the LORD's love is unending.

How do we suffer—as taught in v. 17—from our own iniquities? When we cry out to the LORD what happens? What is the LORD's response? Explain.

Tuesday, March 16, 2021

Numbers 21:4-9



God's people had a reputation for *un*-thankfulness, and it always led to widespread *un*-faithfulness throughout the population. *They turned away!*

What was the LORD's response to their grumbling and complaining in v. 5? Once the people came to Moses—in recognition of their sins—how did God fix the problem? What is the New Testament response to the problem of sin?

Thursday, March 18, 2021

Ephesians 2:1-10



Paul teaches in this passage that we—all of humanity—are dead in our sin, and that our transgressions separate us from God. We, like the people Israel who came before us, have sought pleasure by gratifying our own cravings.

What did God do for us, and why did God do it? Explain in some detail the ability of God to show us his grace all the time.
